

Members of Squamish Nation honour health-care workers through song and prayer

On Jan. 30, more than 50 people from the Squamish Nation gathered outside Lions Gate Hospital to show their support, using songs of honour and prayer, for health-care workers.

The group included singers, dancers and drummers and was brought to the site by Darren Yelton, a Squamish Nation carver, whose mother has been a patient at LGH for the past two and a half weeks.

Yelton said that during his visits to the hospital, he noticed health-care workers going above and beyond to provide his family and other patients with the best care possible, despite it being a challenging time in health care and he wanted to express his gratitude in this special

way. **COVID-19 TESTING**

On Feb. 1, a further revision to COVID-19 testing guidelines was published on the BCCDC website, with adjustments to the populations eligible for testing at health authority operated testing sites. Many of the changes were made to ensure those who are eligible for COVID-

Populations with symptoms consistent with COVID-19 which are currently recommended for COVID-19 testing include: Individuals who are moderately to severely immunocompromised Individuals who are unvaccinated, partially vaccinated or whose vaccines are not up to date (have not received their booster) including those:

- 60 years of age and above
- 18 to 60 years of age **and** who have certain chronic conditions
- Individuals who live or work in settings with others who are at high-risk for severe illness
- Health-care workers in hospitals, long-term care facilities, assisted living facilities or community clinics
- First responders (police, emergency medical technicians/paramedics, firefighters) • Staff and residents in congregate settings, such as long-term care facilities, shelters, correctional facilities and group homes
- o Communities that are far from testing sites and hospitals, such as rural and remote communities, or work camps
- Pregnant people • All Indigenous people living in both rural and urban settings
- Clinicians are reminded not to refer patients for testing at any health authority run site if they are not included in one of the above categories. Those who are not eligible for testing will not be offered a test at any VCH testing site.

Currently, results from COVID-19 testing are used by VCH to determine patient eligibility for available COVID-19 therapeutics. For clinicians,

we advise referring eligible patients with symptoms to access testing. If they complete a rapid antigen test and test positive, they are

advised to submit their result through the provincial survey. These data are used to follow-up with those who meet current treatment criteria for COVID-19 medications.

outbreak management guidance for long-term care (LTC) and seniors' assisted living (AL) settings. The new outbreak management guidance provides recommendations to health authorities, facility operators and staff on managing

Updated outbreak management protocol for long-term care & assisted living

COVID-19 cases and contacts during an outbreak at LTC and seniors' AL units/care homes that are located within or connected to LTC care homes. It reflects current orders from the Provincial Health Officer, public health recommendations and Ministry policies for LTC settings.

What is changing? • Single designated "social visitor" is now called the "designated visitor." These are visitors who help to meet the need for emotional connection and support.

• End-of-life visits are exempt from testing

- What stays the same?
 - Residents may have one designated visitor (and an alternate or back up for extenuating circumstances) • Essential visitors will continue (designated and essential visits can be at the same time)

· Visitor testing will continue, but is limited to a maximum of three tests per week for each visitor

Visits can continue with COVID-19 activity in the home under guidance and direction from the local medical health officer

- Visitors 12 and over need a rapid test • Masks must be worn for the duration of visits
- Visitors must be vaccinated the only medical exemptions that can be accepted are from the Medical Deferral Form for Visitors to **Health Care Facilities**

On Jan. 25, the National Advisory Committee on Immunization (NACI) issued updated recommendations on the use of COVID-19 vaccines in children five to 11 years of age, in light of new data on vaccine safety. NACI now recommends that a complete series of Pfizer-BioNTech

the <u>Get Vaccinated</u> system, parents and guardians can choose options based on their child's specific care needs.

Comirnaty vaccine should be offered to children in this age group who do not have contraindications to the vaccine, with a dosing interval of at least eight weeks between the first and second dose. VCH child-friendly vaccination options

For a child-specific experience, look for an "Ages 5 to 11" specific appointment at vaccination clinics throughout the VCH region via the Get Vaccinated system. For children who require a quieter space, book an appointment at a clinic with individual rooms via the Get Vaccinated system. These clinics

Children five to 11 are welcomed at all VCH vaccination clinics, each of which have health-care professionals trained to support children and their parents or guardians though the vaccination process. For children who need additional support during their vaccination, parents and

Getting children vaccinated from COVID-19 provides a number of critical benefits. While children five to 11 years are at a lower risk of severe outcomes from COVID-19 than other cohorts, vaccination will reduce the risk further. The protection afforded by vaccination can also help children and families continue to engage in important activities, including attending school and recreational activities, and

minimize disruptions to family life and education due to self-isolation. These factors significantly benefit the physical and mental health of children, which has been negatively impacted by the pandemic. Further, as requirements for travel in Canada and other countries continue to shift, vaccination of eligible family members with World


