There will be an incremental easing of guidelines regarding social and organized gathering and adult sport and fitness. The public health guidelines will be reviewed again by Mar. 15 and again by April 12. Note, some existing public health measures will remain in place for many public settings, including the mask mandate, B.C.'s vaccine card COVID-19 safety plans. Some of the most noteworthy updates include:

 Restrictions removed on all indoor personal gatherings · Indoor and outdoor organized gatherings can return to fully capacity, with dancing allowed • Indoor seated events return to full capacity, including movie theatres

- Fitness centres, adult sports, dance and swimming return to full capacity, with no tournament restrictions • Restaurants, bars and nightclubs return to full capacity with no table limits, while mingling and dancing are allowed

How can eligible symptomatic patients access treatment

In order to be considered for treatment, patients with symptoms who meet the criteria for therapeutic intervention should be referred for testing by their health-care provider. At testing sites, VCH staff conduct an initial screening of symptomatic clients, who will be tested as per BCCDC guidelines. If a patient tests

positive, information determined at the test site, in addition to a patient's medical history will support in determining their eligibility for

VCH referral process for community patients VCH has established a central intake process which will operate from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. seven days a week. This team is responsible for reviewing laboratory data and clinical history from positive patients, in consultation with Infectious Disease physicians. If a patient is

deemed eligible, this team will liaise with the individual directly to schedule an appointment for intravenous Sotrovimab treatment, or to

share information on how they can access oral medication in the community. This may include contacting their local pharmacy who will

lead in dispensing the appropriate medication to the patient. A VCH/PHC referral form is available for clinicians who identify a client that may be eligible for treatment. Physicians can submit completed referrals via email COVID.therapy@vch.ca or fax 604.875.5375.

Health-care worker vaccinations Reminder: register and book your COVID-19 booster

Health-care workers who received dose 1 and 2 of a COVID-19 vaccine, and who wants a booster, can register now and book a booster appointment six months after their dose 2 vaccination. Pregnant people 18 years and older can get a booster dose 8 weeks after their second dose. You must make an appointment for a booster dose.

First and second vaccine doses will continue to protect you from COVID-19 until you get a booster dose. A booster dose helps maintain your

level of protection as your immunity may decrease over time. For information on booster doses, visit the **BCCDC** website.

Answer: There are multiple ways to get fit tested, including through the Mobile Rapid Response Fit Testing team, or by booking a visit through the People Safety team at one of our various testing locations.
