### **COVID-19 vaccinations** Kudos to staff and medical staff who delivered over 600,000 COVID-19 vaccinations at

the Vancouver Convention Centre Thanks to the efficient delivery of B.C.'s booster campaign, many thousands of residents in the Vancouver Coastal Health region received

COVID-19 vaccine at the immunization clinic at the Vancouver Convention Centre, and with lessening demand and high vaccination rates across the region, the clinic closed on Feb. 20.

The downtown clinic first opened in March 2021, and during the five months of its initial operations, delivered more than 418,000 vaccinations. Since re-opening in January 2022 to support the province's COVID-19 booster campaign, the clinic has delivered more than 5,000 immunizations a day, for an estimated total of more than 600,000 vaccinations administered since the start of the COVID-19

vaccination campaign. We wish to thank our clinic staff for their hard work and dedication, as well as our partners, including BC Pavilion Corporation (PavCo), the Vancouver Convention Centre and Ceres Terminals Canada. VCH continues to regularly monitor vaccination clinic operations, resources and demand, and to adjust our approach based on community needs. Resources from this clinic will be redirected to other healthcare services, including targeted outreach efforts in specific communities

## B.C. updates COVID-19 case and contact follow-up guidelines

The goals of our pandemic response are still to minimize severe illness and deaths while enabling normal societal function as much as possible. Vaccination is by far the most effective and safe public health intervention for achieving these goals, and B.C. has one of the

highest vaccinated populations in the world. Against this context, and with the highly transmissible but less severe omicron variant as the dominant strain of the virus, contact tracing has become less useful as a tool to prevent the spread of COVID-19. The updated guidance from BCCDC notes that Public Health is no longer facilitating routine case notification and contact tracing, but continues to provide

New guidance issued Feb. 17 by the BCCDC for the management of COVID-19 cases and their contacts in the community reflect the

remain in place to provide focused support, particularly for higher risk settings, and many of the tools, resources and skills gained through the pandemic response will now be utilized in other areas of Public Health. The transitional CCT Team is available for support at COVID19@vch.ca. Resources to support programs managing COVID cases in health care settings are available on the VCH IPAC and BCCDC websites. With Public Health no longer providing individual case and contact follow-up, it's important for clinicians ordering COVID tests to take note

of new tools and referral pathways for COVID-19 therapeutics for eligible patients. These therapies include an anti-spike protein

In VCH, the Case and Contact Tracing (CCT) team has adapted and adjusted in approach and size as the pandemic has evolved. Under this new provincial guidance, some team members will return to prior roles, or shift to new ones, while a core group of contact tracers will

### Health-care workers who received dose 1 and 2 of a COVID-19 vaccine, and who wants a booster, can register now and book a booster appointment six months after their dose 2 vaccination. Pregnant people 18 years and older can get a booster dose 8 weeks after their second dose. You must make an appointment for a booster dose.

# First and second vaccine doses will continue to protect you from COVID-19 until you get a booster dose. A booster dose helps maintain your level of protection as your immunity may decrease over time.

Q&A for medical staff (physicians, nurse practitioners, midwives & dentists)

Answers: Peer testing is available for health-care workers who work in clinical settings, but only if they develop COVID-19-like symptoms while at work. If health-care workers develop symptoms at home or elsewhere, they should not access peer testing at their workplace, but should instead visit a COVID-19 collection centre in their community. Staff and medical staff who wish to access testing services at work

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4) COVID cases include patients that are residing from within VCH/PHC, outside the health authority, out of province, or out of country.
5) COVID positive incident dates is the date the patient tests positive in hospital or the date of admission if the patient's positive occurs before hospitalization.

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6) Cumulative cases are based on total incidents over time; a patient is counted once with multiple admissions for COVID, if readmission is within 30 days of initial infection.


