Number of consecutive missed once-daily doses	Action	Example – Last regular dose received 100 mg on Monday
1-3	No dose adjustment needed. Give regular dose and notify pharmacy	Missed Tuesday-Thursday. Presents to ED on Friday: administer 100mg
4	Pharmacy cancels prescription. Re- assess. Give 50% of regular dose or 30-40mg, whichever is higher, and refer back to OAT prescriber	Presents to ED on Saturday, administer 50 mg
5+	Pharmacy cancels prescription. Re-assess. Give 30-40 mg and refer back to OAT prescriber	Presents to ED on Sunday, administer 30-40mg (depending on prior starting dose)

Important information

- Know your local hospital protocol for administering **methadone**.
- Consider consultation with a local addiction specialist or call the BCCSU 24/7 Addiction Medicine Clinical Support Line at **778.945.7619** for:
 - > Doses of <30 mg if being prescribed for OAT
 - Concurrent acute withdrawal or intoxication from second substance
 - > Acute medical illness that may reduce tolerance

Transition of care

- **1.** Document dose given in ED to minimize double dosing and prevent prescription cancelation:
 - Notify usual pharmacy or
 - Enter dose on Pharmanet via TMU function, if available in your ED
- Community prescriptions are automatically cancelled after 4 consecutive days missed:
 - Ensure next-day follow-up or
 - Provide bridging prescription at dose given in ED if completed POATSP course
- **3.** Forward documentation to usual OAT provider or clinic.

Harm reduction

People are at higher risk of overdose if they miss OAT dose(s).

- Offer a take-home naloxone kit and safer use supplies.
- Direct to overdose prevention sites or supervised consumption sites.
