





Immunization Guidelines for Employees in Child Care Facilities

As a childcare worker, you need to ensure your immunizations are up-to-date. It's important for you, those you care for, and your family. Vancouver Coastal Health recommends many vaccines for adults, most of these are given free in BC.

Childcare workers should get an influenza vaccine every year and a booster of tetanus and diphtheria (Td) vaccine every ten years. You may also qualify for more free vaccines if you missed your basic series of vaccines in childhood, or depending on your health, age, and other risk factors. If you are uncertain about your immunization status, you can safely get more vaccines.

Take your immunization record to your doctor, public health nurse, or nurse practitioner and ask about your needs for the following vaccines:	
Recommended and free vaccines for all childcare workers:	
$\overline{\mathbf{A}}$	Flu (influenza), every year
$\overline{\mathbf{A}}$	Tetanus/ Diphtheria, a booster is needed every 10 years
V	MMR (measles, mumps, rubella) All childcare workers born 1970 or later require two doses of MMR vaccine. If you were born earlier, ask your health care provider about your needs
$\overline{\mathbf{A}}$	Chickenpox (varicella) if you have not had chickenpox disease
Other vaccines you may consider for your personal benefit: Available for a fee (some exceptions apply), speak with your doctor, pharmacist, or travel clinic.	
V	Meningococcal (meningitis), one dose free for adults up to 24 years of age who missed their dose in school
V	Pertussis (whooping cough), available in combination called Tdap vaccine
V	Hepatitis B, free if you were born January 1, 1980 or later
V	HPV (human papillomavirus)
V	Hepatitis A, Shingles, and Travel Vaccines

As a childcare worker, you have unique and intense exposures to young children on a daily basis. Keeping your immunization status up-to-date is vital to your role.

Ensure your employer receives your immunization record after getting any vaccines.
